Colin Walklin

Colin was born and lived all his life in the Bromley area. He went to Beckenham Grammar School and did his National Service in postwar Germany.

He met Carol at Beckenham Arts School and they both attended the Royal College of Art in the 1950s where they studied Graphic Design - Colin designing 'The Cruel Sea' poster for Ealing Studios when still a student.

Colin and Carol were married for over 70 years and collaborated on printmaking and teaching at West Dean College, as well as their own creative art work. Colin was a skilled teacher of printmaking and, after leaving Lintas as an Art Director in the late '60s, he headed the Art and Careers Departments at Forest Hill School for many years.

Colin was a keen hockey player and a senior member of club management at Orpington Hockey Club. He enjoyed growing his own vegetables at Beckenham Allotments - working up to three plots before scaling back his efforts in his 80s.

Colin's love of choral music spanned his whole life. He participated in many Beckenham Chorale performances and was a dedicated member of St Mary's Choir for over 50 years. At his prime he was one of an impressive team of five basses, infamous for wry (and extremely funny) comments from 'the back row'. His encouragement and beautiful rich, deep voice were inspirational to many.

The church community was an integral part of his life: most recently, at the Friends' fundraiser, *Here, There and Everywhere,* Colin reprised a favourite - Edelweiss - not a dry eye in the church! He will be very fondly remembered by all his fellow singers and sadly missed by his three children Nick, Janey and Sarah.

Remembering

This year, Remembrance Sunday was very different for us all. With no services being allowed to be held in church and with very limited numbers being allowed to gather at memorials, we decided at St. Mary's to pre-record a service, which was shown via Facebook on 8 November.

This was followed up with a very simple laying of wreaths at the Shortlands Memorial on Armistice Day, 11 November, where I was joined by Charles Wood from the



7th Bromley Scout Group and Gill Dawson from the 2nd Shortlands Guides.

Whilst pre-recording does allow the use of graphics, images, video and audio, it does not replace the gathering of people as a community in one place, remembering those who have given so much for our freedom and liberty. Let us hope and pray that next year we will be gathered together for this important service to so many. **Revd Gary Best**



Ralph was born in Bristol in 1933, followed by his brother Phillip and then sister Patricia.

The family left Bristol when Ralph was about 12 and moved to Beckenham where they opened a family bakery – Lampards - which traded for 65 years.

Ralph did his National Service in Egypt, working as a baker feeding the troops. When he returned home, he joined the family business where he worked with his brother Phil until retirement.

Ralph married Betty in 1972 and in doing so got himself a ready-made family with Alan in the package, soon followed by John in 1973. They moved into their new home in Durham Road where they brought up the family: four grandchildren followed. Sadly, Betty died in 2009, leaving a big hole in the family.

In time, Ralph was introduced to Barbara and a friendship grew: for the last ten years they found happiness together.

Ralph had joined St Mary's 2WWs group: he and Barbara went on to enjoy attending their events together, as well as sharing a love of travel and jazz.

Ralph was a keen sportsman, playing football and cricket for local teams. He played squash in the early days but snooker was his passion: he regularly played for the Conservative Club until he couldn't see the balls properly!

Ralph was a member of the Master Baker's Association for over 40 years. He was also a member of the Rotary Club for over 40 years and served as Chairman. He always did a lot for good causes, meeting with fellow Rotary Clubs in Holland and making close friends along the way,

Ralph was a people person: he will be greatly missed by so many. While current restrictions limited the number of people who could attend his funeral, his Rotary Club formed a Guard of Honour as his coffin was taken into the Chapel at the Crematorium.

June Barnett

June was born in 1946. At six weeks old, she contracted polio from a nurse. As her family already numbered five children, June was sent away to school to Sunshine House, Gosport, a children's home equipped with facilities for the disabled, only returning home in the holidays.

Her early years were blighted by many hospital stays and operations to try to alleviate her pain

June studied telephony at a residential course in Leatherhead. She worked in London, galloping along on both sticks to Elmers End Station and managing to get on and off the train independently. She also travelled abroad and particularly loved Italy.

June worked at the Masters car showroom at Elmers End, propelling herself there in an electric pavement buggy - an erratic driver at the best of times! She then graduated to an electric wheelchair. Later in life, confidence ebbing, she almost wrapped herself and her chair around a tree – time to give up!

As a young woman, June sang in the choir, at St James's. She had a beautiful voice and was a member of St Mary's choir for some time.

June continued to practise her religion throughout her life, attending Wednesday morning services and enjoying singing hymns, while bedridden, as a resident of Durham House.

June spent her last year at the Park View Nursing Home, Upper Norwood, where she passed away peacefully in September.

Despite the chronic pain and discomfort she suffered all her life, June took comfort in her singing and her music. She will be remembered with love and compassion.

Sound and vision

Long-standing readers of SPAN will remember that we have been thinking about potential redevelopment of the halls and other buildings at St Mary's through our 'Future Generations Project'.

We know that these buildings are well-used and much loved by both the church and local community and we remain committed to enhancing the quality of local community life through this project.

Experience during the pandemic has shown us that, as well as valuing the opportunity to come together in our buildings, people also very much value the chance to be with us 'virtually' through the services we have been streaming. It's been wonderful to welcome to our congregation those who are self-isolating, those who are unwell and others from further afield.

Even once COVID is, we hope, a distant memory, we want our services to be accessible to people who cannot physically be with us in church for whatever reason. In addition to our regular services it will be wonderful to enable attendance at funerals, weddings, baptisms and so on

We want the experience of attending St Mary's services remotely to be as good as possible. We've been investigating how, by investing in camera and audio-visual equipment, we could improve the visual quality of what people watching at home see and the sound quality of what they hear.

The great news is that we've already raised enough funds through our Future Generations Project to be able to afford the equipment and we're now looking at different options to find the right solution for St Mary's.

We will keep you updated on progress.

Hope in the darkness

"The people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned." (Matthew 4:16, Isaiah 9:2).

St Mary's service for the departed is held during the Christian festival of All Souls: this year it was on Sunday 1 November. The service aimed to offer hope for people mourning loved ones that the darkness and the heaviness of the loss will be lightened by the love and compassion promised by Jesus to those who mourn.

As a visual representation of this, during the service the lights were extinguished as names of those who have departed from this life were read. Once the lights in the church had been turned off, candles were lit from the Paschal Candle. The Paschal Candle is an ongoing reminder to the Church, throughout the year, that Jesus continues to lighten the darkness in our lives.

It was heart-warming to see the darkness and gloom in the church replaced with the beautiful light of candles throughout the space. It is hoped that this, a visual reminder that God remains with us, will also offer ongoing hope that the darkness of grief lightens eventually.
