We have brought forward our Parish Picnic to mark the weekend of King Charles' coronation. On Sunday 7 May, in our grounds, there will be the usual bouncy castle and barbecue and on Saturday 6 May we will stream the Coronation and surrounding events from 11.15am in the church. We invite you to join us if you would like to share the experience.

Some of us have only known one monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, and for some of us this will probably be our last sovereign. The new king promises to be very different to his mother. Already he is challenging the exclusivity of his coronation service. Charles wants us, his subjects, to be able to see the previously private anointing of the new sovereign by the Archbishop albeit through a special screen.

He also requests a service that recognises other religions and incorporates their contributions, ruffling not a few ecclesiastical and organisers' feathers. To be honest this includes mine! The liturgy for the service is still held up with a fortnight to go. I have been following social media for opinion and comments and do feel that the head of the Church of England should recognise the Christian and traditional nature of his coronation. It is a prestigious event and perhaps not an occasion for modernism and may back fire.

Having said all of that, we have just experienced Holy Week and the world-changing events of Resurrection Sunday. Perhaps we should not try to protect God in an increasingly multi-cultural world. It is possible that our faith may be strengthened when challenged by our changing societal and cultural context.

Whatever happens, this is our world and Charles is our King. Jesus himself would have joined in the party!

Exploring the Holy Land

In March this year I experienced a tour of the Holy Land with around 140 American pilgrims, three from the UK, one Australian and three from New Zealand. The aim of the tour was to combine biblical teaching with archaeological sites and particularly newly discovered 'Tels' (man-made mounds).

Before the trip, I was encouraged to read 'The Source' by James Mitchener and what good advice that was. When we visited Meggido, I could see how the fictional mound called Makor in the book Makor echoed the findings of the archaeological investigation of that site.

Highlights of the tour were the trip to Gilgal Rephaim; literally the Wheel of Ghosts. We had to travel on four-wheel drive trucks and create a human chain to help each other over a muddy



stream. The burial site is flanked by a massive serpent-shaped mound that one could miss if looking in the wrong direction.

At the other end of the spectrum, Nazareth village was a moving depiction of Jesus' young life. One could imagine the child Jesus sitting at the carpenter's bench, picking vegetables and weaving cloth with his mother and just living the life of the village. We learned how the three pressings of olive oil connected to the pressure Jesus was under shortly before he was crucified: in the garden of Gethsemane (which means 'oil press'), he asked to be spared three times.

Joan was born in 1931: she was still a young girl when evacuated to Tonbridge with her elder sister at the beginning of World War II.

Remembering

Joan was a keen student and later taught her children to recite French and German numbers, phrases and songs as she tucked them into bed at night. She also helped them learn dance theory, earn cubs/brownie badges and tackle homework.

She accompanied Pam and Gill to early dance classes and on one occasion took great delight in showing off her ability to do a cartwheel.

Whilst husband Bert worked at their Hither Green and Bellingham sites, Joan managed the Catford and then Shortlands business premises. When not serving in the shop, she spent her time at a sewing machine making clothes and costumes for her daughters' stage shows

Joan loved to travel, both flying and cruising, and particularly enjoyed holidays and excursions with her sisters. From home, Joan relaxed by taking Skipper the family dog for walks.

Once the family business was sold, Joan became a very dependable volunteer for Community Link and a receptionist at Relate. When not working, Joan organised coffee mornings at Franklyn House before settling down in her flat to solve the crossword.

On Sundays, Joan enjoyed going to church. She loved the calmness, friendships and particularly singing the hymns and being part of the choir. She even continued mouthing the lyrics behind her Covid mask. During her final year of illness she appreciated having the Sunday service streamed over an iPad.

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Visiting key biblical sites made the scriptures spring to life and meaning, for example the mountains that are so central to the narrative such as Mount Hermon and the Mount of Olives. We visited the Jordan river north of the Sea of Galilee and learned that this is likely to be the real Valley of the Shadow of Death, a place full of grave sites or Dolmans, where John the Baptist was almost certainly baptising,



At the Sea of Galilee we embarked on a 'Praise boat' and headed into the centre of the Sea singing and worshipping as the mist gathered over the water. It was special! So much more to tell!

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Christian Aid Week 14-20 May 2023

In May each year St Mary's supports

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Christian Aid, a charity that works to alleviate poverty and give practical support to communities in some of the poorest countries in the world. This year, as well as the effects of the climate crisis, soaring costs are adversely

affecting people in these countries. In Malawi the prices of food, fuel, fertiliser and school fees have doubled in the last year. Farmers are seeing their harvests fail because of increasingly erratic weather and, more recently, Cyclone Freddy has had a devastating effect. Floods have washed away crops, more than half a million people have been displaced and hundreds have lost their lives.

As well as providing immediate assistance to those affected by the floods, Christian Aid has been working with partners in Malawi to help farmers transform their livelihoods. Part of this work focuses on encouraging planting of drought resistant crops such as the humble pigeon pea, which is a high protein food crop.

Your donation can help families in Malawi to plant better seeds, secure a fairer price for their crops and build a better future for their children. During Christian Aid Week (14-20 May), we will be delivering Christian Aid envelopes to homes in Shortlands.
